Why Grass Matters: Our competitive advantage

Grass is the cornerstone of profitable and sustainable livestock farming in Northern Ireland. It is the lowest-cost forage available, providing high-quality feed that underpins dairy, beef, and sheep production. With our mild, wet climate and long growing season, Northern Ireland can grow grass more efficiently and competitively than most regions in the world. By optimising grass growth and utilisation, farmers can reduce reliance on imported feed, lower production costs, and cut the farm's carbon footprint — while maintaining top animal performance.

About GrassCheck

GrassCheck aims to help Northern Ireland farmers grow and utilise more high-quality grass by demonstrating good grassland management, exchanging experiences and expertise with the wider NI agriculture industry. Measuring, recording and budgeting grass has helped assist GrassCheck farmers decision-making in terms of grassland management and therefore improving on farm sustainability.

GrassCheck is a joint initiative of AgriSearch, AFBI and CAFRE, co-funded by AgriSearch and the DAERA. AgriSearch manages the farmer network component of the project, including coordination of participating farms and stewardship of associated farmer data.





What's Involved

Participating farmers will be expected to:

- Measure grass weekly and recording pre- and post-grazing covers.
- **Sample grass** regularly for quality testing (bi-weekly for dairy and monthly for beef/sheep).
- **Record data** in AgriNet each week:
 - Input grass measurements
 - Stock numbers & weights
 - Diet (grass, silage, meal)
 - Fertiliser/slurry per paddock
 - Milk litres, fat & protein (for dairy farms)
- Take part in Knowledge Exchange (KE) and training events.
- Complete **annual benchmarking** (financial, physical & carbon).

Who We're Looking For

AgriSearch is seeking up to **50 farms** (half dairy, half beef/sheep) across all counties. Applicants should have:

- Strong grassland management knowledge.
- Majority grass or grass-clover swards.
- Reasonable sized grazing block and paddock setup.
- Willingness to measure, share data, and learn.
- Commitment to KE activities and training.

Training & Support

- Work closely with AgriSearch facilitator to set and achieve individual objectives.
- Opportunity to attend up to 5 training events per year (on-farm or online).
- Annual project opening and closing meetings.
- Support from external experts and advisors.
- Opportunity to attend an annual study tour





Farmer Payments & Benefits

- Up to £800 per year performance-based payment:
 - £800 = ≥80% data recorded
 - £600 = ≥60% data recorded
 - £400 = ≥40% data recorded
- Additional £200 for attendance at ≥2 in person events
- Additional £500 for hosting farm walk
- Equipment & support:
 - Platemeter (if required),
 - AgriNet account (€170 value)
 - Grass sampling analysis (£36/sample)
 - Access to nearest weather station data.
